The 135th Annual Sturton and Stow Show was a great success with warm weather and an excellent turnout from the public contributing to a fantastic Show.

Entries were up overall, (which is a real achievement given the high number of entries last year). This year the Committee was determined to put Agriculture at the forefront, we approached this in a number of ways including the School picking 'Food and Farming' as the title for their art and craft design classes, we had a vintage plough at the front of the school welcoming visitors into the show as well as information boards about the ploughing match and the Waudby family's involvement. Vintage tractors, modern tractors, Young Farmers stand and some four legged visitors from an Alpaca Farm, which proved to be a huge draw for visitors. We also celebrated the landmark of the 135th Show with a specially commissioned beer sold at the Show and named the 'Tipsy Turnip'

We had a reasonable turnout of Classic Cars, and it was great to have the Fairground Organ to provide added traditional atmosphere. Most visitors stayed for most of the afternoon enjoying the Youth Club refreshments, visiting the stalls, buying raffle tickets and generally enjoying the exhibits. The



children's school art and craft design were admired by the judges and visiting public and we would like to thank the school for their support once again.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2023

Your Parish Council has been very busy during the last 12 months working hard behind the scenes to make your village a lovely place to live though it has been

another full of change and challenge.

In particular, we have completed our pilot engagement with the **Riparian Project** team from Lincolnshire County Council, but flooding is still occurring. During Storm Babbet, the worst deluge since 2019, some properties suffered flooding and the centre of the village and outlying roads were impassable. Flooding emergency measures were triggered using the sand bins on The Close and School Lane. You will be pleased to know that the bins are now refilled and ready in case of further floods. We are in discussions with various agencies to try and alleviate these problems.

The Neighbourhood Plan is currently under review (this is mandatory); the few changes needed will not impact directly on any of the policies. References will be brought in-line with the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan. It is exciting to see that a number of aspirations identified through the community engagement process have already been implemented;

The event was again well attended and raised vital funds for the maintenance and upkeep of the Recreation Field

village hall, a new permissive path was created with the help of Bransby Horses allowing a lovely circular walk with the option of refreshments at the Cafe. Finally, Tillbridge Road will see the 30mph zone extended to the edge of the village.

All this work takes some commitment, but it is a rewarding role. As well as the up-keep of the village, Councillors comment on planning applications, and at present, the Solar sites consultation. The latter is especially daunting since we have not just one but three National Infrastructure Projects to grapple with. We have vacancies for those interested in contributing.

In summary, other projects completed during the last year are:

- Installation of new flat roof at the rear of the Old Schoolroom
- Repointing of the Old Schoolroom brickwork
- Installation of new play equipment
- Lobbying District and County Councils about roads and footpaths (especially Queensway)

Purchasing new tools for the up-keep of Jubilee Wood I would like to take this opportunity to thank all my fellow councillors for their help, support and wise counsel during my time as Chairperson. This will be my last report, time has flown by and I wish everyone well for the future.

Have you considered becoming a Parish Councillor?

The Parish Council is made up of 9 elected Councillors and currently there are vacancies.

There are just over **700 households** in the Parish, which includes: - Sturton by Stow, Bransby and Westwoods. The Parish Council represents and serves the whole community. It establishes policies for action and decides how money will be raised and spent on behalf of the community. It is responsible for spending the money lawfully, without risk and achieving the best value. It provides the bus shelters, village seats and litter bins, Parish grass cutting, including Public Footpaths, litter picking, and it provides the equipment and maintains the 3 village play parks - (behind the village hall, The Glebe and Old Rectory Gardens). The Council is also a consultee on planning applications within the Parish.

The Parish Council is funded mainly by an annual precept, which is collected by West Lindsey District Council and paid to the Parish Council in April and is included on your Council Tax Bill. By committing just one evening each month to attend a Parish Council Meeting you can influence what happens in your Community and if you feel you can contribute and would like to join us please contact our Parish Clerk Stacey Hoyland Emailsturtonpc1@gmail.com

What made you choose Sturton? We wanted a change of career and looked far and wide for opportunities to do




The Village Hall Playpark re-opened on Tuesday 14th November 2023 following the official launch of the installation of the new basket swing, a fantastic new addition to the playpark.
