Community Speed Watch

The final Community Speed Watch session for 2024 resulted in no vehicles at all being recorded travelling at 35 mph or above. This was good news although the overall statistics for 2024 are not quite as encouraging. Forty-two one-hour sessions were held in total with three further sessions having to be cancelled because of bad weather. Nearly 10,000 cars were monitored with just under 2.5% being recorded at 35 mph or above.

However, the figures for Tillbridge Road are worse – over 5% of vehicles were recorded at 35+ on the stretch from the new 30 mph limit to Eastfield.

The Speed Watch group will be resuming its activities in January monitoring traffic on all four roads into the village and we are always looking for more volunteers to join our group, so if you have an hour or two to spare each month you would be made most welcome (full training and equipment is provided).
