Parish council chairman's report 2021

The year 2021 has not been without its challenges, but over-all the Parish Council have had a productive year.

ife had been gradually getting back to 'normal' and as we are all aware circumstances change quite quickly with regards to Covid. We continue to cope with the ever-changing constraints and restrictions which have been, and continue to be, imposed. The Parish Council held successful monthly meetings via Zoom, which may return at some point, but whilst we can meet face to face we convene at the Village

Hall. Thanks go to the Village Hall committee for their help with setting up a Covid secure venue.

he ditch behind The Glebe has been cleared and is now flowing properly taking excess surface water away from the houses. Trees and hedging have been trimmed and the grass mown. Trying to keep the villages tidy (and litter-free) is a never-ending job and your help with keeping your boundary hedging/shrubbery in check is just as important as anything we as a council can do. Some of our footpaths/pavements are narrow and encroaching flora has a big impact. The daffodils planted in verges around the village looked lovely in spring and the planters have had a splash of colour. Thank you to all those whom have been taking care and watering the flowers. Je have a new defibrillator, sited at the Co-op on the wall of the store nearest the car-park. The Coop have generously paid for and will maintain this vital piece of equipment.

t times, it seems like we have been inundated with planning applications. We comment and sometimes take part in planning meetings, but the relevant authorities make their decisions - not always in line with what we would wish for. We have also commented extensively on the Central Lincolnshire Draft Plan for housing. A very large and complex exercise. There is a big push for renewable energy and you will be aware of the three Solar Farms which are currently under consideration - Cottam, West Burton and Gate Burton (Stow Park). As more information is released, we shall be able to see what this may mean for our parish. Sadly, St Hugh's Mission has been sold

and whatever plans are being made for this grade II listed building and wall remain to be seen.

The Neighbourhood Plan is now at the Regulation 16 stage. The statutory 6-week consultation with West Lindsey has finished and the plan, along with any comments, will be sent to an independent planning inspector for scrutiny in January. Once the result of this is known (we hope there will not be too many amendments required) you will be able to vote and then our plan will be 'Made'. This will help with the development of the parish over the next few years. The

Gordon's mother, Lillian, lived for 40 years in the 'boot and shoe shop' on the High Street and living to the ripe old age of 100 and Jennifer being part of the well-known Judges family.

Gordon remembers when the village, a lot smaller back in the 70's and 80's, predominantly comprised of four family names - the Bradshaws, the Gelders, the Credlands and the Lucas'. He has seen the changes the village has been through as it gradually expanded. He is happy though that it still has the village feel to it but sad that a lot of the original inhabitants are getting few and far between as the years go by.

Gordon and Jennifer knew each other from a young age when they both lived on Saxilby Road and, after Gordon had served two years in National Service, they got married in 1962 at Stow Church. The wedding reception was held at the 'old' village hall in Sturton (pictured right). They have lived in many different locations around the village one of which was the bungalow on The Close opposite the Village Hall which they built in 1972. Gordon spent seven years as an apprentice joiner to Wardell's so had they experience. After moving around the village 12 times, they have now settled on Eastfield.


